The Australasian Masters has come to an end for another year & in a repeat of last year's result, the foreign Grandmasters all shared first place with 6/9. Although all of the Grandmasters lost one game to a local International Master, they were overall the most consistent players in the tournament & deserved to share first place. Of the Australians, Anton Smirnov once again shone, leading for much of the event before losing his final round game against Vasily Papin when fighting for not only first place in the tournament, but also for his first GM norm. The locals players all had moments in the tournament where they showed what they are capable of, however none were able to maintain this high level throughout the tournament.

The IM event was dominated by eventual winner Kanan Izzat, who thoroughly deserved his first place with an excellent score of 7.5/9. Of the others, it was the younger players who performed the best, particularly Yi Liu, who by his own admission did not play his best, however he managed to find ways to win games from difficult positions, eventually finishing in a tie for second place with Igor Bjelobrk.

Games GM Event

Murtas Kazhgaleyev played the Queen's Indian Defence against Moulthun Ly & followed a theoretical line for over 10 moves. The position remained fairly level, with both players keeping their opponent's tactical possibilities under control, with exchanges leading players towards a draw. With more exchanges about to occur, Kazhgaleyev offered a draw, which Ly was happy to accept.

Rustam Khusnutdinov played a quiet line of the Vienna Opening against Luke Li & appeared to get very little out of the opening. However, when Li decided to castle on the queenside (after Khusnutdinov had previously castled kingside), Khusnutdinov unleashed a devastating attack on Li's king. Although Li tried to defend, he was ultimately unable to keep Khusnutdinov's pieces at bay, with Khusnutdinov winning material to leave himself a bishop ahead in an endgame, which forced Li to resign.

Anton Smirnov played a Maroczy Bind against Vasily Papin's Kan Sicilian & gained a significant space advantage out of the opening. However Papin's position remained solid and when Smirnov looked to gain more space on the queenside, Papin countered in the centre & established a dangerous knight on f4. Although Smirnov looked to still have some initiative, Papin quickly brought his queen into the attack & when Smirnov faltered in his defence, Papin seized his opportunity & found a nice tactical finish to an exciting game.

Bobby Cheng played the Catalan against Junta Ikeda & got a fairly even position out of the opening, however Ikeda quickly struck at Cheng's centre & gained a strong initiative as a result. Cheng sacrificed an exchange to try to make his defensive task easier, however Ikeda continued to attack & force Cheng's pieces back. When Cheng made another slip in his defensive efforts, Ikeda found a nice mating attack to finish off the game.

Karl Zelesco played a type of London system against Max Illingworth, who responded aggressively with a number of pawn thrusts. Zelesco defended well to hold off Illingworth's pieces, before sacrificing a pawn to try to make his defensive task easier. After Zelesco regained his pawn, Illingworth played a combination to go into a queen & pawn endgame, however neither player could make any progress in the position & the game was eventually drawn.
